Many years ago, when I raised my right hand and swore an oath to become part of our Nation's Armed Forces, my family was there to witness. It was certainly a proud day for me and for them. Many of you have probably had the same experience as your family or friends witnessed your commitment to Nation and State. We raised our right hands but, as you may recall, our families did not. As I reflect

Certainly the separation itself adds to the anxiety.

system to be my "family" as I am sure many of you do. Our Wing team is very aware of the importance of family as exemplified by the growth and excellence of our Family Readiness Group (FRG). Mrs. Lisa D'Agostino has been providing FRG leadership for the past four years and, with her impressive group of volunteers, makes sure our families are ready to go! They provide a variety of special events throughout

the year including Galaxy Camp for Kids, Wing appreciation breakfast, deployed family luncheons, deployment departures and returns receptions and children's holiday party to name a few.

01 CRITICAL DAYS OF SUMMER

On a sunny May 20, members of the 106th Rescue Wing were treated to a surprise demonstration. During the 101 Critical Days of Summer annual safety presentation held inside the dining facility, a three vehicle accident occurred. The accident, located near the first intersection on base, involved a motorcycle and two SUVs. The people in the two SUVs were injured in the accident while the motorcycle rider died. One of the drivers was intoxicated and the other driver was texting while driving. The motorcycle rider was the only member of the accident who was following the appropriate rules of the

road. The intoxicated driver had minor injuries and was taken away in a police car, the other two victims, whose injuries were worse, left in an ambulance, and the motorcycle driver was taken away in a body bag.

Members of the 106th Rescue Wing went to the scene of the accident to watch members of the Southampton Police Department, the Westhampton Beach Ambulance and the Base Fire department as they attended to the victims. The event was arranged by the 106th Rescue Wing Safety Office and the victims were played by Victoria Alpert, of the Westhampton Beach Ambulance and 106th Rescue Wing members Maj. Scott

Williams and Maj. Michael S. Rutigliano. The event was coordinated as part of the 101 Critical Days of Summer with the main goal of getting "the message out and trying to reduce the mishaps on the roadways," said Senior Master Sgt. Joe Kruk, Ground Safety Officer.

ABU Uniform Results

As a result of a recent Air Force Virtual Uniform Board, several items have been standardized for the utility uniform (ABUs/BDUs):

- 1. Trousers must be tucked into boots and present a bloused appearance at all times.
- 2. Tuck in boot laces; excess boot laces may be wrapped around the boot and tucked in. No "Bowtie" boot laces.
- 3. MAJCOMs authorized to approve wear of black boots with the ABU only in industrial areas IAW 132024Z Feb 09 HQ USAF/A1 Message.
- 4. Eliminate authority to attach organizational cap to BDU trouser.
- 5. Upper sleeve pocket approved for fire resistant ABUs authorized for, and worn in only, the AOR.

Raven Training

By now everyone has heard that we have two new Phoenix Raven qualified Security Forces members within the 106th Security Forces Squadron (SFS). These are the first members of the 106th SFS to graduate from the Air Mobility Warfare Center's Phoenix Raven Program. Since taking over as the Security Forces Manager last July it has been my goal to establish this vital force protection program. It is one of the first things that my personnel were requesting from me when they found out that I too am a Raven. Our new Training Manager Master Sgt. Gary Calhoun worked hard to secure the slots. That combined with Tech. Sgt. Terry Maler and Staff Sgt. Anthony Legotti giving 150% to graduate this intensive course has gotten our Raven Program off the ground. These members are bringing back a skill set that they can

pass on to our squadron, enhancing the overall mission of the 106th SFS. Many of you may not know what it means to be a Raven, so let me try and shed some light on that for you.


The Raven program came into existence after two children stowed away in the wheel well of an unsecured C-141 in Mongolia and an aircraft guarded by host nation forces was damaged at a Senegalese airfield. The Commander of the Air Mobility Command (AMC) determined that although geographic commanders had overall force protection (FP) responsibility in their areas of responsibility, providing adequate

FP was problematic in locations without a US military presence. In the aftermath of the bombing of Khobar Towers in 1996 and as a result of other serious events around the world, the former AMC Commander Gen. Walter Kross, and former 436th Airlift Wing commander, directed implementation of the Phoenix Raven Program in February 1997 under the leadership of former AMC Security Forces director and Air Force security forces officer, Col. Lawrence 'Rocky' Lane. Colonel Lane started the Raven program in 1997 and earned him the title Raven #1 after graduating in the first Raven class that same year. Since then, Ravens from within the command and Raven-trained security forces from outside the command, have accompanied over 1,900 AMC missions to international hot spots around the globe.

Ravens are a special breed of Security Forces members. We are members who have readily accepted


the responsibility to ensure the success of our force protection mission. We are all volunteers who are ready to deploy at a moment's notice to provide protection for Department of Defense assets around the globe.

Completing Phoenix Raven Training is no easy task. As they say at the AMC Warfare Center, "We simulate nothing." You will be tested like you never have been within Security Forces. You will be punched in the face. You will fight both the instructors and fellow Raven students. I myself walked out of my ASP evaluation with two black eyes. Your day begins with a three to six mile formation run, followed by many hours in the REDMAN Room. It is better known to students and instructors as the International House of Pain. A lot of blood and sweat will be spilled in the IHOP. The PT sessions in the



Combat Readiness Squadron, Air Mobility Warfare Center Fort Dix, N.J.

The Raven training program is an intensive three-week, 14-hour-a-day course covering such subjects as cross-cultural awareness, legal considerations, embassy operations, airfield survey techniques, explosive ordnance awareness, aircraft searches, and unarmed self-defense techniques. The students receive nearly 130 hours of instructional training during their nearly three weeks of training. There is more than 100 hours of classroom academics along with anti-terrorism training, pressure point control techniques and sections on the collapsible baton and weapons. In addition, the students have to pass a rigorous physical training regimen. Phoenix Raven training is designed to provide security forces members with the skills required for their unique mission and







The HQ AMC Director of Security Forces is the focal point for all Phoenix Raven operations supporting AMC airlift operations. On behalf of the AMC/SF Director, a Phoenix Raven Program Manager serves within the staff as the interface between the headquarters' staff and the units. In addition to the Raven Program Manager, the AMC/SF Contingency Branch coordinates with other major commands, and Air Reserve Component Security Forces to ensure Raven-trained personnel are available at overseas en route locations to support AMC missions unexpectedly diverted.

AMC has over 200, active-duty Raven trained security forces members assigned at bases nationwide. A small portion of the trained force is maintained at Charleston AFB, Dover AFB, Travis AFB, McChord AFB and McGuire AFB and at limited bases within the European and Pacific Theaters.
